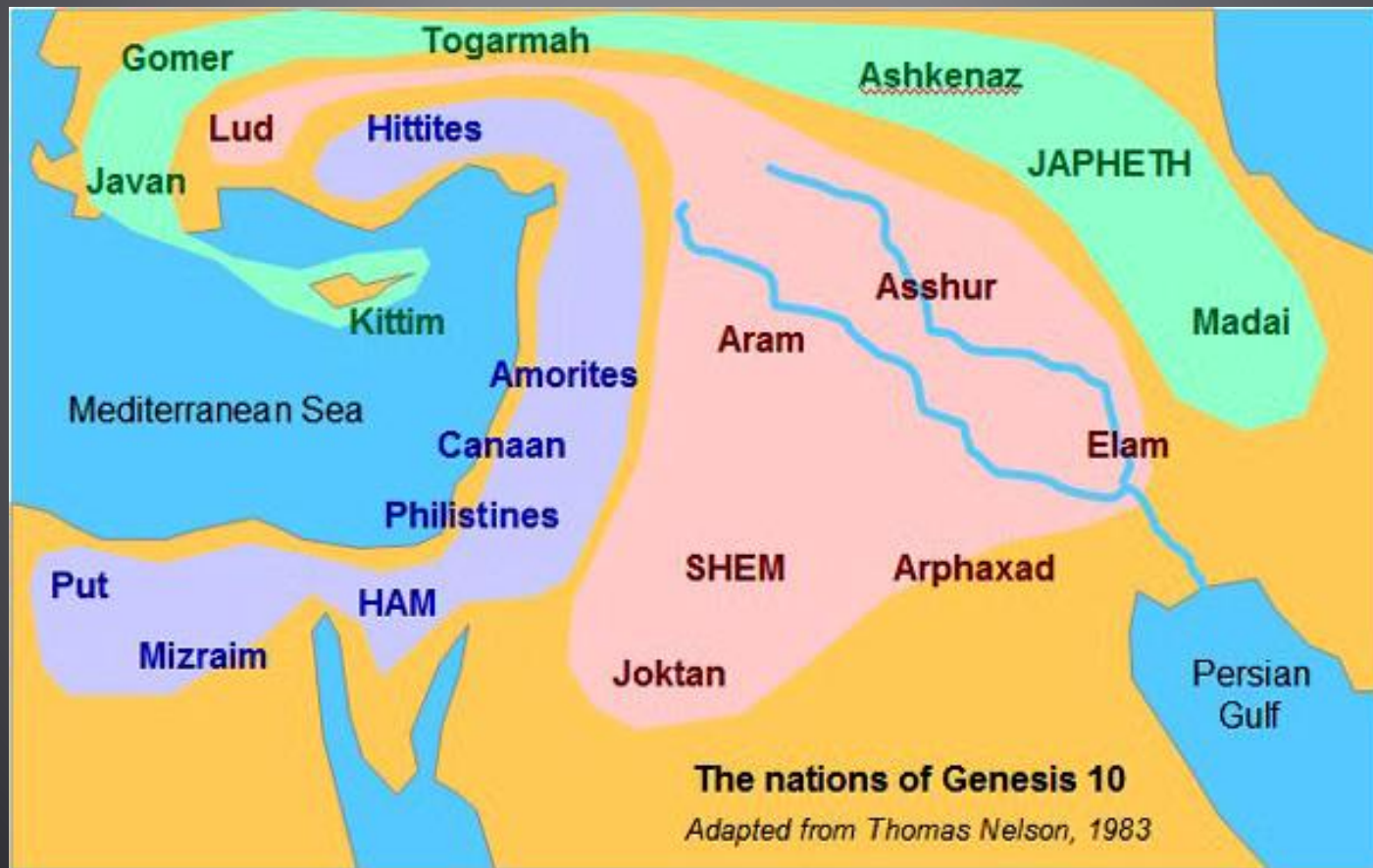

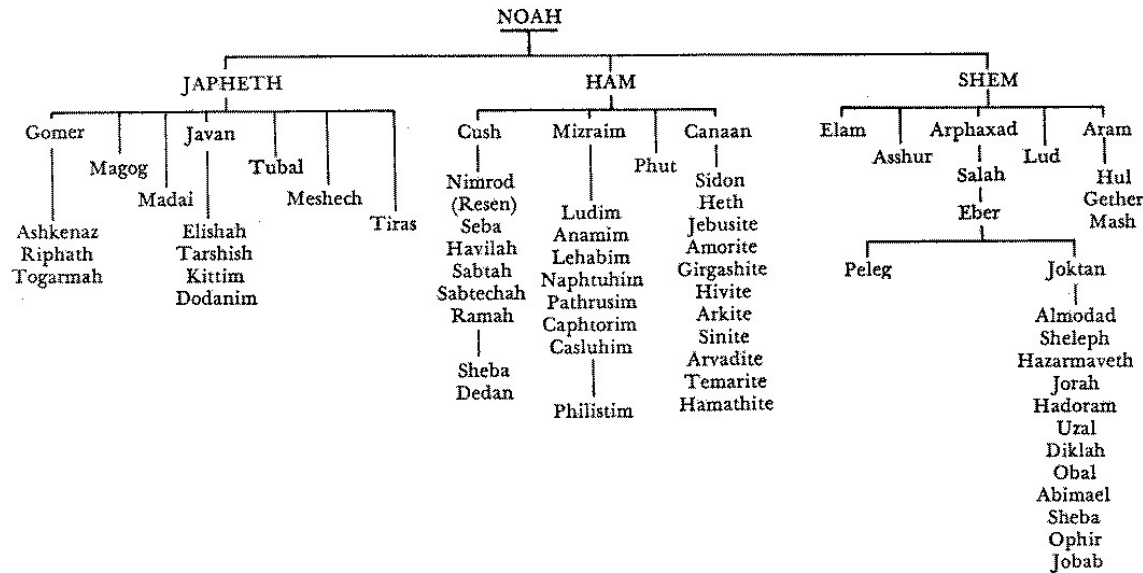

What Meaning Can We Pull Out of the Flood Story?



The Flood story is linked with the creation story where God is organizing/re-organizing his creation to allow for the fulfillment of his blessing.

As such, the Flood represents NOT JUDGMENT of humanity but grace.

The covenant of Noah is a turning point in how God deals with creation – from a creation-wide corporate judgment over sin to an individual/people group approach.

Our response today should be the same as Noah, to acknowledge God's grace.

“Hey guys, I have a new Bible that doesn’t have any of that judgmental OT God stuff.” – Marcion, 2nd c. CE



Who is God?

- “I am about to bring the Flood – waters upon the earth – to destroy all flesh under the sky...” (Gen. 6:17)
- “The LORD rained upon Sodom and Gomorrah sulfurous fire...he annihilated those cities...all the inhabitants of the cities and the vegetation on the ground.” (Gen. 19:24-5)
- “When the daughter of a priest defiles herself through harlotry, it is her father whom she defiles; she shall be put to the fire.” (Lev. 21:9)
- “They [the Israelites] exterminated everything in the city with the sword: man and woman, young and old, ox, sheep, and ass.” (Jos. 5:21)

Understand the Hebrew Worldview

Modern World: *Focus on composition or formational history*

Hebrew World: *Focus on the functional reality and human experience*

Creation Story:

How did God create light and darkness (v.4-6) when he didn't create the sun and moon until v. 14?

Understand the Hebrew Worldview

Foundational idea:

God set up the world to function in certain ways:

- *Physical world (rain, seasons)*
- *Religious world (keep the Sabbath, religious festivals)*
- *Social world (“Honor your father and mother”)*

Understand the Hebrew Worldview

Alternative to order: chaos (pictured as water)

God acts to protect the establishment of order:



*When the world becomes
unbalanced, God “rebalances”
the world to “reset” his creation.*

That's "fascinating"*



Why did God cause the Flood? (Gen. 6:11 – 13)

Where else in Genesis did God “re-order” the world to his specifications?

Just as in the Creation story, God is ensuring that the world is a place that allows for his divine blessing by “re-creating” the world via the Flood.
